### A Letter from the Headmaster



These past few months have been both extremely busy and encouragingly successful here at King's, with very strong public examination results in the summer at both GCSE and A level. These ensured a very strong league table showing for the school at both local and national level, but league tables do not by any means tell the whole story. What is most important is the number of impressive individual success stories, and the way in which, in traditional King's fashion, academic excellence has been combined with full commitment to the enormously wide range of activity which goes on beyond the classroom here. The autumn term was characterised by an excellent school production of The 39 Steps, a succession of outstanding concerts and impressive results across all the sports which we play. Here too individual successes have been noteworthy, with junior and even senior international honours achieved by a number of pupils.

It has also been a busy period for OV activity, with a tremendously enjoyable London

drinks party held at the Bankside Gallery in October and a reunion for ten year leavers at school just before Christmas. OVs have also been widely involved in inspiring our current pupils; we much enjoyed opera singer Allan Clayton's visit as a Barnabas Speaker and have also benefitted from the expertise of OVs at our business skills conference and from their help in conducting mock interviews for our Sixth Form.

The work on the recently released film for our bursary campaign, Open the Door to King's', gave us the opportunity to meet with many OVs, to hear how the school shaped their lives and to listen to their stories of life after school. As you all know, a great many pupils at King's benefitted from the education here during the period of direct grant and assisted places and have gone on to great things as a result. One of the most appealing elements of the atmosphere at King's is its inclusive, welcoming feel, and the governors and I are anxious to ensure that the school should continue to provide access to education for those who will benefit most, even if their families do not

have the means to pay. As is evident from the bursary film, the generous funding of bursaries has a life-changing effect and any support in this area is hugely appreciated. 2019 will again see a wide range of activity for OVs. The Foundation Office will once more be present at Henley Regatta, we are looking forward to hosting our annual OV Reunion Weekend in May and the Himalayan Club is holding a fund-raising lecture at school in March. # Memories

I was greatly amused by Donald Howell's note and it prompted me to put this together for a smile.

The letter from Donald Howell on the Memories page of Connect struck me as a splendid recollection of the redoubtable "NED" Dilks. It brought back to mind another interlude. He always delighted in reminding us that the old spelling guideline "i before e except after c" was incomplete and therefore inaccurate. In full it is: "i before e except after c, where's a long ee sound". He insisted that there were only three exceptions in the language, namely seize, weir and weird; and he promised a reward of 6d (two and-a-half pence today) to anyone who could come up with another. Many of us applied ourselves to this challenge and someone eventually came up with sheikh, pronounced, as we thought, "sheek".

On being presented with this he instantly (as ever) came back with the retort: "The word is not sheikh, pronounced "sheek"; it is pronounced "shake". So it proves the point that the rule is incomplete without the addendum about the long ee sound." The note of triumph in his voice was unmistakeable.

There is a postscript to this. In 1987 I moved with my family to Northumberland. There are many tales up here and there is much evidence towards the Scottish borders of the violent activities of the so-called Border Reivers. One day it suddenly occurred to me that incontrovertibly the correct pronunciation is "reevers". How I longed for many years to be able to meet up with NED and claim my sixpence! Or would I have faced another quick-fire response which found a way of ruling out my challenge?

He looked equally furious with me and said something along the lines of 'well, you called it. What happened next put all of our efforts to fight the stereotyping of front row forwards back a number of years. I proceeded to remind him that I had called 'Orangutan' and to my amazement he said 'exactly'. When I started to look at him more quizzically, he blurted out 'yeah, you said A-rangutan didn't you? That starts with an A doesn't it' - I guess English was never his strongest subject at school. Marc Roberts, who had been watching all of this unfold on the side-line just burst into laughter and loves to remind me of this story every time I see him.





# King's Today

The King's U13 cricketers won the County Cup in June with a thrilling eight wicket win against Bromsgrove School. Bromsgrove hit one hundred and forty-seven for five in their twenty overs. Despite good innings from King's openers Joel Cox (thirty-nine) and Sam Hawes (twenty), King's still needed nine runs an over with just four overs left. However, Cameron Jones and man of the match George Tomlinson (forty-nine not out) kept their nerve to see King's home with seven balls to spare.



The Fourth Forms staged The Railway Children in the John Moore Theatre. This was a highly ambitious choice as a junior play but an excellent ensemble handled its challenges with aplomb, creating a rich evening's entertainment with moments of real poignancy. Congratulations to all involved; judging by the talent on display the future of King's theatre looks bright.



The King's School Worcester is again delighted with outstanding A Level results this year. An impressive 93% of grades achieved were A\*-C, with 77% of results A\*-B. These are the strongest results at this level for a number of years. Leading the way were Head of School, Alice Evans, who achieved three A\* grades and one grade A which helped secure her place at University College, Oxford to study Biomedical Sciences, and Ollie Colebourne who achieved 4 A\* grades in Chemistry, Maths, Further Maths and Physics. Joe Ashton, Bill Bishop, Andrew Salkeld, Lucy Goodman and Jamie Havercroft all also achieved A\* in 3 or more A Levels.

Towards the end of July the Geography Department took twenty Upper Remove (Year 10) pupils to the French Alps. Days were spent learning about the physical surroundings and included plenty of walking along mountain trails to see the Alpine landscape. Highlights included walking through ice caves carved into the Mer de Glace, taking Europe's highest cable car to 3842 metres and enjoying a number of leisure activities. The pupils were excellent company and worked hard throughout the trip.



King's Worcester pupils came out winners of the Languages Prize at the RAF/National Space Academy/Business Language Champions International Space Challenge competition at RAF Cosford. Three teams of Upper Removes and Fifth Formers representing French, German and Spanish each completed design, construction, marketing and engineering challenges at the national event with the German team winning the Language Prize and Spanish and French teams both commended for effective team work.





In October Cadet Sergeant Will Gorner led a team of ten army cadets to Nesscliffe Training Area to take part in our Brigade's annual Military Skills Competition. The team spent the Saturday visiting various stands on which they were scored, with the team winning the Gun Run stand (something the team had never practised). Sunday morning brought the March and Shoot Competition in which the team had to perform a forced march around a two point two mile long course followed by an air rifle shoot. The team managed to come sixth out of seventeen teams in the March and Shoot and seventh for the overall Milskills Competition.



RGS Worcester retained the Modus Cup following an exciting game and a strong performance both from RGS and the King's 1st XV team on Wednesday evening.

King's supporters packed the East stand of the Sixways Stadium on a beautifully clear autumnal evening, as Captain Max Richardson led the team into The Modus Cup Challenge, now in its twelfth year.

A strong start from both teams made for a pulsating first half, with King's registering the first points of the night when fly-half Ethan Summerwill landed a penalty on 23 minutes. RGS missed a penalty kick just four minutes later but crossed for their first try moments later and continued to extend their lead to 12–3 at half-time.

RGS continued to add to the scoreboard during the second half, but King's were undeterred and were rewarded with a fantastic try from full-back and Vice-Captain Charles Clark in the 44th minute. RGS responded with their fourth try which was converted, taking their lead to 26-8.

King's right wing, George Hale, went on to score an unconverted try in the 54th minute but RGS sealed their win in the 70th minute with a fifth try, taking the final score to 32 – 13 in favour of RGS.

# The King's School and the First World War: Armistice and Remembrance

During the course of the First World War, The King's School lost 79 OVs and three former masters to the violence of the battlefields. When peace was declared on 11 November 1918 King's, like hundreds of other institutions across the country, felt moved to erect a memorial to the young men that they had lost.

The circular letter sent out in 1919 set a target of £2,000 for a permanent roll of honour in College Hall, and a memorial window in the Cathedral Cloisters. The letter also proposed that scholarships should be provided for sons of OVs killed in the war; a new fives court be constructed in the playground; and a new cricket pavilion be erected on the New Road ground.

The Roll of Honour in College Hall was erected during the 1918 Christmas holidays. When the completion of the other projects was in sight, Cuthbert Creighton (Headmaster 1919-1936) arranged a special two-day Old Vigornian Festival beginning on 18 June 1921. Three cricket matches were played between the School and the Old Vigornians. After the lunch interval Canon Chappel, Headmaster of King's 1896-1918 and now President of the OV Club, performed the opening ceremonies. The drums and bugles of the OTC Band sounded the Last Post as Chappel unveiled the inscription and declared the pavilion open. The drums and bugles then sounded

the Reveille and the cricket was resumed. In the evening some 70 Old Vigornians and masters sat down to dinner in School House.

T.E. Rammell had joined King's in 1891 as a master with a keen interest in sport. The cricket pavilion was a project very near to



his heart, as he had been master in charge of cricket. He gave £500 to the project, and when the costs exceeded this figure, took the whole extra burden on his shoulders. The plaque over the entrance to the pavilion ends with a Latin inscription from Virgil's Aeneid, 'HAEC OLIM MEMINISSE JUVABIT' – 'These things one day it will be a pleasure to remember'.

On the following day, 19 June 1921, the School War Memorial Window in the North Cloister Walk was dedicated by Dean Moore Ede, Chairman of the Governors. In each of five main lights of clear glass eighteen or nineteen names were lettered under the school shield. Scenes from the life of St. Wulstan filled the small lights in the tracery above. Two platoons of the OTC, with the drums and bugles of the Band, were again on parade. The Cathedral Choir approached from the Chapter House, singing Psalm 121, "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills", with its moving last verse, "The Lord shall preserve thy going out and thy coming in: from this time forth for ever more". The Last Post was sounded and, after the Dean's dedication, Reveille. The Dean gave a short address. The burial hymn was sung, "God of the living, in whose eyes unveiled thy whole creation lies", and the procession, followed by the OVs and the School, moved into the Cathedral for Matins. Canon Chappel preached the sermon.



The first War Memorial Scholar joined the school as early as May 1920. He was **Malcolm Royle** (Ca 20-27), the eldest son of **Capt. Dennis Carlton Royle, MC** (Dayboy 1893-1889), who had been killed in August 1918.

Royle's other two sons came to King's in 1924, **Donald** (Ca 24-32) and **Raymond** (Ca 24-33).



King's two Fives Courts on the school playground were repaired and a new one was built there in 1922 as a further

part of the War Memorial appeal. But the popularity of Fives gradually declined over the years and, having fallen out of use, the three courts were demolished in 2003. A memorial plaque was installed on the castle wall next to the original plaque from 1922. Both can still be seen today.

A.D. 2003 The removal of three disused Memorial Fives Courts enabled this area to be greatly improved for the recreation and enjoyment of all pupils.

In September, we were pleased to welcome **Alan Bufton** (Ch 49-57) back to King's and were glad to be able to show him a variety of school photographs and memorabilia, while he shared some of his schoolboy memories with us.

Also in September, **David Shrimpton** (Br 55-63) came up to Edgar Tower to view photographs and old Vigornian magazines from his years at school.

In October, **David Morris** (S 52-62) visited the archive and kindly put names to faces of school photographs he had previously donated to the archives – thank you very much indeed.



# Features on Teachers

### E.R. Burkhill

Geography Teacher, Head of Geography, Careers Master, Assistant Tutor Chappel House, 1969-1997.

Having undertaken his teacher training in Oxford, Bob Burkill arrived at King's in September 1969 as part of the Geography department. His dynamic teaching was an important feature of many pupils' school experience here for nearly 30 years.

Extremely knowledgeable about his subject, Bob enjoyed taking King's Geography GCSE and A Level students on field trips to many destinations including Wales, Scotland, Devon, Switzerland, the French Alps and Tunisia.

Outside the Geography department, Bob shared an immensely popular Saturday morning extra-curricular politics course with Bob Allum. Elsewhere, he enjoyed participating in the King's School staff pantomime. His passion for cars was legendary, and he even ranked his pupils' work not to the traditional "A, B, C" mark scheme, but according to makes of cars. He was also noticeable at King's for his "snazzy" dress sense, sporting brilliant ties and colourful pocket handkerchiefs.

Moreover, Bob was involved from the outset with the Diploma of Achievement at King's, which was subsequently recognised in the Dearing Report, teaching students a range of subjects including basic car mechanics and home economics. When he retired from King's in 1997, Bob developed this further and became National Director for

the Diploma which was taken into prisons, as he believed prisoners should have skills and means of supporting themselves when reaching the end of their sentences.

Bob died in 2010.

Bob's widow, Barbara, recently visited King's and shared some memories of her husband with us of his life post-King's:

"Bob retired from King's in 1997, aged 53, as he was advised by his doctors he should scale back. Alongside his work for the Diploma of Education, he became an examiner and moderator and wrote for University of Cambridge - International Examinations and worked part-time. Bob was a prolific fiction writer in his spare time: this was his way of relaxing from the energy he put into his teaching. He used to shut himself away in his study and write for hours. Bob wrote six novels and one short story. Bob was never happy with his writing, he over-analysed it and didn't get it seriously looked at by agents. He is, as yet, unpublished. His younger daughter, Kimberley Perry (CI 93-00), will now selfpublish his writings via Amazon."

I think he was the only teacher who started a lesson by drawing a random cartoon on the board (which he'd explain only sometimes), who issued red cards like a football match if you misbehaved, and he was definitely the only teacher who wore a plastic tie with real sand and a beach umbrella in it. He's also the only conservative anarchist I've ever met, alas. Talking politics with him was always riveting.

Outside school, Dad has made an incredibly positive impact on me. I'll never forget one brilliant piece of advice he gave me: 'live your life in technicolour, not beige'. I've based some of my best life decisions on that advice, including taking a leap of faith and moving to New Zealand.

I still miss him every day - his huge imagination, ridiculous humour (who else would stick Swiss flags on an Audi, and insist on wearing only red shoes?), and his unshakable faith in me and others are impossible to replace. When I see current world events I frequently wonder what Dad would make of it all. He would no doubt spark a fierce debate!"

## **Andrew Underwood** (S 77-88)



## **King's Memorial Garden**

Two years ago, we were advised that an Old Vigornian had passed away and had included King's as a beneficiary in his will. The OV did not have close family members and hence he had directed that his estate be left to The King's School Worcester Development Trust and any monies realised be used to support pupil bursaries at the school. Leaving a legacy to King's is a very personal and meaningful commitment, representing support for the work of the school and our new memorial garden is a way of recognising these important contributions. The garden will also be developed as a quiet space in school for children and other members of King's to sit and enjoy our School Gardens. The garden also allows us to incorporate into the daily life of our pupils a visible reminder of the generosity of those members of the King's family who have gone before them and who felt that King's played an important part in their lives.

The 1541 Society is a group that recognises those individuals who have made a legacy pledge to King's and allows us to thank them in their lifetimes and each spring we hold a dinner as a 'thank you' to our 1541 Society members, in the Michael Baker Boathouse.

This autumn we planted our memorial tree, a 'Norway Maple' (Acer platanoides 'Princeton Gold') in the School Gardens, in sight of both Worcester Cathedral and the River Severn. We look forward to seeing the tree grow in years to come, displaying bright yellow-green leaves in the spring, turning to burnt orange in autumn.


